


Chapter 1 - The Introductory Rites: Entrance Chant to the Greeting *



In the Hebrew Bible, the word **Qahal** (translated "congregation" or "assembly") refers to the people of Israel. The Greek and Latin translation of this Hebrew word is *Ecclesia* or Church, an assembled group of the faithful. The Descent of God the Holy Spirit on the apostles gathered in the Upper Room on Pentecost is a nodal point in the development of the Church and kicked off the definitive gathering or assembly of God's people.

Our coming together at Holy Mass is a gathering of the Church. Ushers may welcome the congregants as they arrive. People seat themselves, some in their favorite pews. There should be a period of silence to allow people to prepare themselves for the celebration.

There is *proximate preparation* and *remote preparation* for Holy Mass. Remote preparation takes place during the week before Sunday Mass. Members of various groups, such as *Come*, *Lord Jesus!* and *ACTS*, read and discuss the coming Sunday's readings. This can also be done within your homes in a family setting. Proximate preparation includes the observance of the Eucharistic fast from food and beverages (except for water and medicine) for at least one hour before receiving Our Lord in Holy Communion. You may choose to fast for longer periods. A person conscious of mortal sin should receive the Sacrament of Penance before receiving Holy Communion.

Mass begins with the Introductory Rites. *Merriam-Webster Dictionary* defines the word *rite* as a ceremony done according to prescribed words and actions. The Introductory Rites are those initial ceremonies comprised of the Entrance Chant, the Sign of the Cross and greeting, the Penitential Act, the Kyrie, the Gloria, and the Collect. These rites "have the character of a beginning, an introduction, and a preparation. Their purpose is to ensure that the faithful, who come together as one, establish communion and dispose themselves properly to listen to the Word of God and to celebrate the Eucharist worthily." In some celebrations of Holy Mass, the Introductory Rites are modified "according to the norms of the liturgical books," for instance in Masses of Christian Burial, Wedding Masses, the Palm Sunday Mass, and the Easter Vigil.

The Entrance Chant opens the celebration during the procession of the Priest, Deacon, and ministers. This chant fosters "the unity of those who have been gathered [and] introduce[s] their thoughts to the mystery of the liturgical time or festivity" Festivity denotes joy and gladness, rejoicing in the Lord our Savior and in one another. Singing is also a sign of our unity in faith and in love. The Church desires her people to sing during Divine worship.

Don't be afraid to lift your voices in song. Sing at home those wonderful hymns that we all know, such as Christmas carols and hymns to the Blessed Mother. My mother used to sing and whistle religious tunes while at home going about her regular housework. That was always inspiring to me. See what you can do in your homes to promote singing with your family. In my Christmas homilies, I ask and challenge people to sing a Christmas carol of their own choosing before they sit down to eat their Christmas dinner. Sing at home regularly and you will be prepared to sing here in Church.

When the procession arrives in the sanctuary, the Priest and Deacon reverence the altar with a profound bow or, if the Blessed Sacrament is present, with a genuflection. As an expression of veneration, they kiss the altar. The Priest may also incense the cross and the altar. Incensation heightens the solemnity of the celebration, lifts our hearts in prayer, and elevates our souls to the Lord. † The altar is "the table of the Lord to which the People of God is convoked to participate in the Mass, and it is also the center of the thanksgiving that is accomplished through the Eucharist."


At the conclusion of the Entrance Chant, the Priest and the congregation sign themselves with the Sign of the Cross. The Priest greets the people, thus signifying "the presence of the Lord to the assembled community." The greeting of the priest and the response of the people manifest the mystery of the Church gathered as one. After the greeting, the Priest, the Deacon, or a lay minister may briefly introduce the congregation to the Mass of the day.

ONE-MINUTE CATHOLIC APOLOGETIC

WOMEN'S ORDINATION

Why doesn't the Catholic Church ordain women as priests? The Church has always recognized and affirmed the dignity of women as spiritual leaders and teachers. In fact, the Church recognizes three women as Doctors of the Church: St. Teresa of Avila, St. Therese of Lisieux and St. Catherine of Siena. And who is more beloved by Christ and the Church than His mother? So why no women priests?

At the Last Supper, when Christ instituted the priesthood, he certainly could have had women there. But he only had the Twelve, men, to stand in

persona Christi and be "fathers" to the family of faith.

Pope John Paul II clarified the issue in his 1994 apostolic letter *Orginatio Sacerdotalis* (On Ordination to the Priesthood). In the Catechism of the Catholic Church, number 1577, it says, "The Church recognizes herself to be bound by this choice made by the Lord himself. For this reason the ordination of women is not possible." The Catechism also says that no one has a right to receive the Sacrament of Holy Orders. But the magisterium has the duty to carry on the ministry of Christ in the manner that He appointed.
