# Chapter IX: Pride and Its Remedies\*

Saint Thomas Aqui-

nas says that pride may be understood in two ways. There is a "good and an evil pride; or a sinful pride which God resists, and a pride that denotes the glory which He bestows. It may also be replied that pride there signifies abundance of those things in which men take pride."\*\*

Sinful pride is the "tendency of esteeming oneself more than is proper and at the same time denigrating the goodness of others. Pride also stirs us to reject the lawful authority of others, including God, over us and to refuse appropriate submission. The proud man is under pressure since he seeks to live the lie that he is more than he really is." A proud person has a *lust for power* and can become *drunk with power*.

Pride is rampant in us and because of our dullness of mind, we are frequently not even aware of its presence. Saint Gregory identified four species of pride: (1) believing that my gifts and talents come from me; (2) God gives me gifts and talents, but I deserve them; (3) asserting that I have an excellence that in reality I do not possess; and (4) despising others and their gifts and believing that I alone possess what I have and no one else.

"The Daughters of Pride are not delineated in the tradition. This is because pride is such a general vice that it is not merely the source of other sins, it is in them." Some theologians do not include pride among the seven capital sins, but say that pride is the mother or beginning of all sins. Others distinguish the general vice of pride and the special vice of pride known as vanity or vainglory that they include among the capital sins. What fuels pride is my perception of how others see me. What feeds vainglory is what I think about myself. Yet in many ways pride and vainglory are interchangeable terms. Curiosity about others is also a form of pride.

Here are the medicines that treat pride and vainglory.

The chief medicine for pride is **humility**, the virtue by which I recognize the truth about myself and see myself as God sees me. Humility helps me to take an honest look at myself and change what needs to be changed.

The beginning of pride is stubbornness in withdrawing the heart from one's Maker. ... God plucks up the roots of the proud, and plants the lowly in their place." (Sirach 10: 12 & 15.)

- "He has scattered the proud in the imagination of their hearts, ... and exalted the lowly." (The Virgin Mary's Magnificat; Luke 1:51-52 [RSV—CE translation]).

- **Gratitude** is acknowledgment of the countless gifts of God. Remember that prideful ingratitude sparked the Devil's revolt against God.
- **Filial fear** is one of the seven gifts of the Holy Spirit that enables us to reverence God.
- **Almsgiving** can be material or spiritual.
  - ♦ The seven corporal works of mercy are (1) feeding the hungry, (2) giving drink to the thirsty, (3) clothing the naked, (4) sheltering the homeless, (5) visiting the sick, (6) visiting the imprisoned, and (7) burying the dead.
  - The seven spiritual works of mercy are (1) counseling the doubtful, (2) instructing the ignorant, (3) admonishing sinners, (4) comforting the afflicted, (5) forgiving offenses, (6) bearing wrongs patiently, and (7) praying for the living and the dead.
- **Docility** flows from the gift of counsel and helps us to be willing to learn from others and to be receptive to the teachings of Christ and His Church.
- Respect directs us to recognize the value of the human person created in God's image and likeness and redeemed by the Blood of Christ.
- **Faith** is a supernatural virtue that is the free gift of God and enables us to adhere and entrust ourselves to God and to give assent to the truths that the Lord has revealed.
- **Temperance** "moderates the attraction of pleasures ... and provides balance in the use of material goods."
- Modesty looks to the dignity of persons and "avoids those things which foster morbid curiosity."††

#### **FUNDING OUR MINISTRIES**





#### LENTEN REGULATIONS

Ash Wednesday and Good Friday are days of fasting and abstinence. This means that we do not eat meat and we have only one full meal. Concerning the Good Friday fast, the Second Vatican Council teaches: "Let the Easter fast be kept sacred. Let it be




celebrated everywhere possible, <u>prolonged throughout Holy Saturday</u>, so that the joys of the Sunday of the Resurrection may be attained with an uplifted and clear mind." (Note: the underlined answers the frequent question, "When does the Lenten fast end?")


The Fridays of the year outside of Lent remain days of penance, but each individual may substitute for the traditional abstinence from meat some other practice of voluntary self denial or personal penance. This may be physical mortification, temperance, acts of religion, charity, or Christian witness.

The obligation to fast, limiting oneself to one full meal and two lighter meals in the course of the day, binds Catholics from the age of 18 to 59. No solid foods should be taken between meals but liquids are permitted. Those who are younger or older may freely embrace these disciplines; however, Lenten regulations should not ever endanger one's health.

Stations of the Cross will be prayed following the 5:30 p.m. Mass on the Fridays of Lent.

#### Lent, the McGivney Way

The Knight's principles help us to better understand and practice prayer, fasting and almsgiving.

Blessed Michael McGivney can give us a helping hand in our Lenten self-denial and spiritual growth. The help he offers is embedded in the very principles of charity, unity and fraternity upon which he built the Knights of Columbus.

If we are to open our hearts to the crucified Shepherd who loves us like no other, our hearts must be aflame with charity. The Church's tradition identifies almsgiving as a most beneficial Lenten practice. It is easy to see an equivalence between charity and almsgiving, which is more than providing financial help to the needy. Almsgiving refers to all forms of charitable outreach to those who are in need — precisely the outreach the Knights engage in. Whether it is supporting the Desormeaux Foundation, providing hurricane relief, or simply helping at St. Joseph's Diner or Food Net Food Bank — all these are ways of putting the needs of others ahead of our own. Through charity, we become more like Christ, who gave himself up for us and for our salvation.

Unity is crucial for the health of the Church. Only when we are united can we fulfill our mission to empower fellow Catholics to live their faith at home, in their parish, at work and in their community. Living your faith is like a team sport; you can do it best together. Unity depends not merely on good will, but rather on our oneness with God, which is attained through a habit of daily prayer. For us all, it is a time to unite in living our faith.

A final word focused on the principle of fraternity: As Knights, we value the brotherhood and solidarity that we and our families share. Nevertheless, often we need to make room in our hearts for someone with whom we disagree. In a word, we need to "fast" from that which undermines our fraternity. During Lent, denying ourselves food and drink can also help us to make more room in our hearts for one another, for those in need, and ultimately for the Savior.

Lent the McGivney way boils down to this: Charity corresponds to almsgiving; unity to prayer; fraternity to fasting. Guided by the principles that Blessed Michael McGivney left us, may we experience our best Lent ever.

# V. THE MUSICAL STRUCTURE OF CATHOLIC WORSHIP The Preparation of the Gifts: Offertory Procession - The Eucharistic Prayer (continued)

The people take part in the Eucharistic Prayer by listening attentively to the words sung or spoken by the priest and joining their hearts and minds to the actions of the prayer. Their voices should be joined together in the acclamations of the Eucharistic Prayer, including the *Sanctus*, the great cosmic acclamation of praise; the Memorial Acclamation, by which the faithful participate in keeping the memory of Christ's Paschal Mystery; and the Amen that follows the concluding doxology, by which they give assent to the entire prayer. These acclamations should be sung, especially on Sundays and solemnities.<sup>151</sup>

Because the Eucharistic Prayer is the central action of the entire celebration, priests should, if possible, sing at least those parts for which musical notation is provided in the *Roman Missal*, at least on Sundays and on more solemn occasions. These parts include the opening dialogue and the Preface, the invitation to the Memorial Acclamation, and the concluding doxology. It is not permitted to recite the Eucharistic Prayer inaudibly while the *Sanctus* is sung.

It is likewise appropriate for priests to sing the entire Eucharistic Prayer, especially on solemn occasions. The chant setting provided in the *Roman Missal* or another composition approved by the United States Conference of Catholic Bishops may be used. "While the Priest proclaims the Eucharistic Prayer 'there should be no other prayers or singing, and the organ or other musical instruments should be silent,' except for the people's acclamations." 152

"It is a praiseworthy practice for the parts that are to be said by all the concelebrants together and for which musical notation is provided in the Missal to be sung." 153

#### The Communion Rite

The high point of the Communion Rite is the reception of Holy Communion. This is preceded by rites that prepare the faithful to receive the Lord's Body and Blood as spiritual food.<sup>154</sup>

The Lord's Prayer and the Sign of Peace are followed by the Breaking of the Bread, "which gave the entire Eucharistic Action its name in apostolic times" and which "signifies that the many faithful are made one body (1 Cor 10:17) by receiving Communion from the one Bread of Life which is Christ, who died and rose for the salvation of the world." This Fraction Rite, accompanied by the *Agnus Dei* chant, is followed by the *Ecce Agnus Dei* and the reception of Holy Communion. The Communion Rite concludes with the Prayer after Communion.

#### The Lord's Prayer

The rites of preparation for the reception of Holy Communion begin with the Lord's Prayer. When the Lord's Prayer is sung, the doxology should also be sung by all. If possible, the invitation and embolism should also be sung by the priest.

#### The Sign of Peace

The brief period of time needed for the exchange of the Sign of Peace must not be protracted by the singing of a song.

#### The Fraction Rite and the Agnus Dei

The supplicatory chant *Agnus Dei* accompanies the Fraction Rite. It is, "as a rule, sung by the choir or cantor with the congregation responding; or it is, at least, recited aloud. This invocation accompanies the fraction and, for this reason, may be repeated as many times as necessary until the rite has reached its conclusion, the last time ending with the words *dona nobis pacem* (*grant us peace*)." When the *Agnus Dei* is sung repeatedly as a litany, Christological invocations with other texts may be used. In this case, the first and final invocations are always *Agnus Dei* (Lamb of God).

#### The Communion Chant or Song

"While the priest is receiving the Sacrament, the Communion chant [or song] is begun. Its purpose is to express the communicants' union in spirit by means of the unity of their voices, to show joy of heart, and to highlight more clearly the 'communitarian' nature of the procession to receive Communion." The singing begins immediately and continues "for as long as the Sacrament is being administered to the faithful." The Communion chant or song may be sung by the people with choir or cantor, or by the choir alone. Because the Communion chant expresses the unity of those processing and receiving the Holy Sacrament, communal singing is commendable. The singing of the people should be preeminent. 
